Arrangements for arriving at school

- Our gates will be open from 8.40am until 8.55am and will close promptly at this time.

In case of absence, please telephone the school office before the start of the school day.

As a school, we are unable to authorise holidays, (this includes attending weddings), and as such all absences will be recorded as **unauthorised**.

We encourage parents/carers to make medical and dental appointments out of school hours where possible, and we will be requesting that families provide confirmation of these appointments should they fall during the school day.

Arrangements for leaving school

Classroom adults supervise children leaving by handing over each child individually to adults who are collecting.

Please inform classroom adults of any changes to collection routines either face-to-face at morning drop off or via communication to the office.

Classroom adults will not hand over children to adults whom they have not been told are collecting children. In any instances where an adult comes to collect a child that the classroom adult is not expecting, school staff will need to make contact with parents/carers to clarify the arrangement.

Please do name all items of clothing.

Any items that are not named and left around school will be placed in the lost property box outside the main school office. This is emptied each half term.

The weather is often changeable so all children should have a waterproof coat available in school <u>everyday</u>.

Watches are permitted, but smart watches which have camera and/or games are not permitted.

One small plain stud in each ear lobe only - no other studs are allowed. For PE these must be removed or covered with microporous tape provided from home.

Longer hair, past shoulder length, needs to be tied back using small, discreet clips, ties or hair bands.

Make-up, transfer tattoos and nail varnish are best enjoyed during the school holidays.

Children that attend a TA Sports club after school may wear their PE uniform on this day.

If they wish to wear a sports kit, they will need to bring this to change into at the end of the day instead.



Snacks and Lunch time arrangements

To perform well in school, children need to have a healthy, balanced diet. This aids their concentration, and ultimately their performance throughout the school day.

- In Year 2, children are offered a healthy snack at school. If your child would prefer to print their own in, that is fine. **Ideally, this should be an item of fruit or vegetable.**
- Children must bring their own reuseable water bottle from home each day. Please make sure they are clearly named. Throughout the day, children have access to drinking water in the classrooms so that they may top up their bottle. Please note, squash bottles (such as Prime) are not permitted.
- We are a 'no nuts' school as there are several pupils and staff who have allergies to these items. Please ensure that children do not bring items of food that contain nuts. This includes Nutella.



OAA

- Outdoor Adventurous Activities (OAA) is an essential part of the PE curriculum and our 'Beyond the classroom' offer. It is led by Miss Biles, who is a qualified outdoor education instructor.
- Classes will attend with their class teacher and supporting adults.
- OAA allows children to develop their problem-solving skills whilst working in small teams and acquiring new leadership skills. Whilst taking part in these OAA sessions, children will learn how to navigate around both a familiar and unfamiliar space, whilst developing basic map-reading skills.
- Children may wear their PE uniform, but will also require waterproofs and wellies.

Early Reading & Phonics

At Charlton, we follow Little Wandle Revised Letters and Sounds to teach early reading and phonics.

We cannot stress the importance of daily reading, and the positive impact it has on children's development.

Reading with or to an adult every day is vital.

In September, we will be offering families the chance to purchase flashcards to support children's learning at home.

Character & Citizenship Awards

These awards are based on four key strands which aim to develop both character and citizenship. Within each strand, children are helped to develop their own sense of self and then a growing sense of how they can influence the school and the wider community.

- Essential me: develop self, show school values, develop positive attitudes to learning
- Enthusiastic me: try your best and achieve a target (linked to school based rewards)
- Courageous me: challenge yourself and try something new
- Responsible me: take action and influence others

The awards are designed to provide an element of choice in the challenges children undertake and dovetail with existing award programmes running in our school.

Children in Years 2-6 complete a total of 20 targets out of a total of 24 with a least 4 per strand.

On completion of **Bronze**, **Silver**, **Gold**, **Platinum**, children are presented with a certificate and pin badge by a special visitor. At the end of KS2, those who have achieved Platinum, are invited to an awards ceremony.

Children in Year 2 will be working on achieving their bronze award. Please do talk to your children about how they are doing and help them to consider what they might already be doing that might contribute towards their awards.

Equipment

So that all items can be returned easily should they be misplaced, please label each item with your child's name.




Homework

Homework is given out on a Friday and is to be returned the following Thursday.

The children are expected to complete a maths fluency activity, which will be stuck into their book.

There is also an optional homework which is focused around other curriculum subjects. This will be given out at the start of each new term, and children can choose which activities they wish to complete and when.



Focused Homework Tasks

Year 2 Maths Fluency Homework is set on a Tuesday to be completed for the following Monday. Please use your Home Learning books to record as you wish. You should also choose one focused task a week.

Use the words before, after, past, present, then and now to talk about the chronological events from Florence Nightingale's life.

R.E Design and Technology

Our big question this term is Try taste-testing same vegetables. As you try them, think about describing 'Who should you follow?' Can each using these words: sweet, sour, you talk to a grown up about crunchy, soft, small, big, bright, dull, smooth, bumpy. Can you think of our autside of school? What own words to describe them? Can makes them a good leader? you try a vegetable that you haven'

Enalish

Write some sentences using the Year 1 and 2 Common Exception words. Make sure you have included a capital letter and full stop. You can find the word list in your child's homework book.

Music

Listen to a nursery rhyme or your favourite song. Can you clop to the beat? Are there other ways to can show the beat to the song? E.g. stomp your foot, nod your head

Science

Have a look at moveable. objects around the home and decide which force you need to use to move it. Is it o push, pull or twist?

Rounders skills:

Can you practice throwing and catching a ball accurately? Can you add in challenges such as turning on the spot, jumping or moving further away while someone throws a ball to you?



Three fimes per week:

Numbers to 20 fluency-you could use these tools:

ONumbats - see separate letters with your usernames and passwords

OHave a go at the "Hit the button" game : Hit the Button - Quick fire graths practise for 6-11 year olds <u>rarks.co.uk)</u> to rehearse doubles, halves and number bonds.

Practice counting in 2s, 5s, 10s and 3s forwards and backwards – ICT games 'duck shoot' is a good game to play <u>Duck Shoot - tablet friendly (ictgames.com)</u>

You will find have found out in your child's report whether this applies to them or not.



Medicines & head bumps

- If your child uses an inhaler, they will need to bring one into school, along with a complete medical form detailing dosage and emergency contact details.
- If your child requires any other medication during the school day, it will need to be brought in a clearly labelled box or bag along with the completed medical form. Please remember we are unable to administer medication without one of these forms.

Head bumps

- Any pupil who suffers a head bump will be issued with a "red bumped head wristband". This will replace the form which was previously sent home.
- The wristband will make it visible to all school staff that a head bump has occurred.
- A wristband will be given to any child who has been presented to a first aider with a bump to any part of their body from the neck upwards (including eyes, ears, nose, lips etc).
- The wristband notifies you that one of our First Aiders looked after and assessed your child and at the time it was not thought necessary to refer him/her for further attention.
- The wristband will have the date and time of the incident.
- You will also receive a call from the school informing you of the incident.
- Children will be told that this band must remain on their wrist until they get home to show parents/carers, including if they attend an after-school club. The band can be removed by parents/carers once children have returned home.



Behaviour & expectations

We encourage all pupils to demonstrate our values of happiness, kindness and responsibility at all times.



We follow a restorative approach which focuses on relationships. If, for any reason, pupils are struggling to meet expectations they will be supported to get back on track. We appreciate your support with behaviour and will discuss with you any issues that your child is having.



Communication

Typically, correspondence from school will come via email.

Updates and reminders will also be shared on Jotter. This is a free app available on Android and Apple which we recommend downloading to stay up to date with school communications.

If your email address, phone number or home address change, please inform the school office asap so that we can ensure our emergency contact details are correct
