We end the term with a little respite from the very wet and windy May we have just experienced, with the promise of some warm weather on the horizon. Term 6 also offers the potential of more normality and, as such, we are busy planning some of our traditional events – from trips and visits, to information evenings and performances. Dates for our planned information evenings will come out to you at the start of Term 6. We are all keeping everything crossed.

On the 12th June, we will be welcoming 6 new ladies to the Charlton team. As part of our outdoor education offer, we will be rehoming some rescued hens. Although they will probably be looking quite sorry for themselves when they first arrive, we hope that they will quickly settle in and start producing some lovely eggs. This will be a great opportunity for the children to develop their understanding of healthy living and the production of food, taking responsibility for the care and nurture of these animals. It will also be a different space for children to visit.

We would very much like to thank our PTA for their continued support and for providing the birds with their new home!

I know that the PTA are planning further events for the remainder of the year to continue with their fundraising efforts for the school. Please do continue to support their events. Without their planning and enthusiasm, and your support, school would very much miss out on the considerable financial assistance.

It would feel rather strange to be writing to you without mentioning Covid! As the situation begins to improve, we are mindful that people's preferences on mask wearing differs. Foundation



We have been enjoying developing our learning through the theme of 'Big Beasts and Mini-beasts' this term. The children have been using non-fiction books and the tablets to find out information. They have painted and drawn lots of animals and have been exploring the creatures that are in Forest school and in our garden. They have enjoyed lots of stories with an animal theme and even wrote their own class book. We have been thinking about habitats and thought about whether we would find a wolf in our forest school....some thought yes, some thought no! The children have loved this theme so much, we will be continuing our mini-beast theme into term 6. Hopefully the weather will be a little kinder to us.





This term, our topic has been based around science. We have done lots of planting, thinking about where our food comes from and how we prepare it to eat. It has been lovely seeing all of the children so enthusiastic for learning and building up our teamwork skills.





This term, Year 2 have explored 'A Twist in the Tale' where they uncovered alternative stories to traditional fairy tales. Children unpicked common traditional tales and added their very own twist to the narrative to come up with their own jumbled up tale, which they read to entertain Year 1. In science, Year 2 enjoyed exploring the forest school whilst looking at habitats and the animals that are native to the UK. They enjoyed having a pond dipping session and some even spotted our resident frog! In geography, the children were busy learning the 7 continents and 5 oceans as well as drawing their own map of forest school and using the 4 main compass points to navigate a partner from one place to other.





This term, we have been really enjoying our work on the Stone Age. We made a human timeline! We have used a range of art materials such as clay and pastels to create our version of the amazing cave paintings and tools created by the earliest people.

In science, we have been studying different types of skeletons and we have had fun investigating whether a person's height has a relationship with the size of their foot! We have been able to put into practise our measuring skills from maths to find out the answer to our enquiry.


We have been learning about fractions and the children have amazed us with their maths work this term – showing focus and determination to 'get to grips' with this tricky topic.





This term, our topic is 'good vibrations' and we have been exploring sound.

In science, we have been testing which materials make the best string telephones. We also used the decibel readers in the new iPads to test sound insulators.





This term, Year 5 we have been learning about India. The children have been learning about the culture, climate and geographical location of the country. Many of the children have enjoyed creating some Indian food at home and have been extra creative making some super rangoli patterns. In Science, the children have been learning all about different lifecycles of mammals, reptiles and birds and spotting those animals that do not behave in the ways we might expect. The children have also listened to and read a number of Rudyard Kipling's "just so" stories and have had a go at creating their own.





Over the Easter break, Year 6 took part in a virtual run. Encouraging time outside and to help raise money for the leavers party. Children could walk, run, cycle or even skateboard from Wantage to Paris (566 km). Mr Conway set up a spreadsheet for the children to record their distances on TEAMS, which then calculated our total distance. They smashed it and even reached 901.48km! An incredible £585 has been raised and we are very proud of them all for their efforts.

This week, Year 6 enjoyed their own French cafe! Throughout the term they had been busy learning how to order food and drink in a cafe setting and they did so brilliantly!



Forest School



We have got wet, muddy, bathed in the sun and been hailed upon!

The children have deeply engaged in their play, learning all the time, not just about what's been going on in front of them but also who they are sharing it with. The Forest school groups have bonded well and there is a real sense of community among them.

The children have fully engaged in the different weather conditions and all the opportunities these can bring.

We have experimented with making paint out of charcoal, meals out of mud, built stages from crates, dens out of tarps, created beautiful braids, balanced on see saws, swung on swings and made fire for food. Our site pond has shared with us friendly frogs, nippy newts and numerous wiggly water bugs.

School site improvements

Project R (Refresh and Renew!)

I am delighted to share with you that we have secured a grant from the Vale Academy Trust to significantly refresh and renew areas of the school site. We are immensely grateful to the Trust for this significant capital expenditure and support to ensure Charlton is the very best school in the local area. Improvement works will be done in stages overtime and wherever possible will be restricted to the school holiday periods. This investment and re-development will provide Charlton with:

- 40 additional IPads to enhance our STEM curriculum
- New fencing around the school perimeter
- New and improved signage around the site
- New hard surfacing on the main playground
- A new chill out 'walk and talk' space for children to use at break times
- New activity equipment (trim trail style)
- Improvements to the Year 1 outdoor space to match the high standard and finish found in the Foundation unit

We will also take this opportunity to make some significant improvements by refurbishing existing classrooms, replacing faulty IWB's and providing additional facilities to deliver subjects such as Art and Design Technology.

Building and improvement work will be scheduled so there will be no impact on the learning of our pupils. Together with our new logo, up-dated uniform and new school website (coming soon) we are extremely excited to be starting work on these eagerly awaited projects.

Exciting times as we look forward and with hope to a forthcoming new school year freer of the current but necessary restrictions.

EU Settlement Scheme (EUSS)

The EU Settlement Scheme application deadline is now less than 50 days away, parents, families, young people and staff that are an EU, EEA or Swiss citizen, and their family members may be eligible to apply to the Settlement Scheme.

It is crucial that eligible parents apply to the Scheme themselves and check whether they need to do so on behalf of their children. Eligible children are required to have an application in their own right and no child of any age is covered by a parent's application to the EUSS. 

Proposal to merge Charlton Acorns Pre-school with Charlton Primary School

We recently wrote to all parents and staff to share the proposal to merge Charlton Acorns Pre-school with Charlton Primary School. A key rationale for this proposal being that the Pre-school shares a site with the school and most of the children who attend the Pre-school move on to Charlton Primary School. In addition, we have had a long and very positive relationship. We feel the time is right to unite and move forward into the future as a single establishment.

A first step to move toward this change was to undertake a formal consultation on two points:

1. To expand the age range of Charlton Primary School from the current 4-11 years to 2 -11 years.

2. To close Charlton Acorns Pre-school Charity and transfer the assets to the management of The Vale Academy Trust as part of Charlton Primary School.

The consultation ended Thursday 22nd April 2021. I am pleased to share that the feedback we have had during consultation has been incredibly positive, and staff across both establishments are very much in favour of this going ahead. The merger also has the full support of the Local Governing Body and Vale Academy Trust.

As such, we can now move to the next stage in this process. This involves Acorns Pre School Committee holding a EGM to vote on closing the charity which runs the preschool and Charlton Primary completing the necessary due diligence and preparing a full business case application to change the age range which is submitted to the Regional Schools Commissioner.

Through the termly whole school newsletters, we will keep you up-dated on developments.

Questions raised during consultation

• What would happen to before and after school wrap around provision provided at Charlton and Acorns?

There are no plans to reduce the wrap around offer currently provided at both establishments. Should the merger go ahead a long-term aim would be to ensure we are able to effectively use resources to meet <u>all</u> demand for before and after school places.

Summer Reading Challenge

Reading at Home

The Summer Reading Challenge: 10th July

The Summer Reading Challenge, funded by the Arts Council, England and presented by The Reading Agency, is a challenge designed to encourage children aged 4–11 to set themselves a reading challenge over the summer to prevent the *'summer reading dip'*.

Each year, the challenge, with the support of public libraries, motivates over 700,000 children to keep reading, build their confidence and develop their reading skills.

We would LOVE for as many of our children to be involved in this fantastic challenge. Taking part in the challenge is great for a number of reasons:

- It's a great way to celebrate the joy of reading;
- It's a great way to find out about new books;
- It's a great way for children to continue to be supported in their reading through the holidays and to prevent the national trend for children's reading skills to dip over the holidays.

This year, with the help of the new digital platform, the aim is to increase the impact even further and reach 1 million children. By providing fun reading activities this summer, the challenge will also play a key role in supporting reading catch-up after a difficult year.

This year's theme – 'Wild World Heroes' – hopes to inspire children to explore ways of helping to save the planet. With ideas from WWF, the challenge focuses on taking action for nature and tackling real-world environmental issues, from plastic pollution and deforestation to wildlife decline and nature loss. Through taking part in the challenge, children will be able to join six fictional characters – 'wild heroes' – to help solve some of these threats, learning about the importance of the environment while helping to restore nature levels in the neighbourhood of 'Wilderville'.

The Summer Reading Challenge Book Collection comprises 70 must-read titles for children aged 4-11. Each title has been specially chosen to reflect key Wild World Heroes themes including the natural world, young heroes, and taking action for the environment.

The collection is presented in two lists – one for younger children and one for more confident readers – representing exciting contemporary children's fiction, poetry, non-fiction and picture books with nature and environmental themes. Many of the books in the collection are newer titles publishing in 2021.



How the Summer Reading Challenge works


Children can read whatever they like in their chosen format – fiction, fact books, poetry, joke books, picture books, graphic novels, audio books and eBooks can all be used to complete the Challenge. They receive special rewards each time they finish a book and there's a certificate for everyone who completes the challenge.

The Summer Reading Challenge is open to all primary school aged children and is designed for all reading abilities. Children can sign up for free at Wantage library during the summer holidays.

Throughout the Challenge, library staff support children, helping them to explore a wide range of different types of books and enjoy a range of creative activities and events.


Tip #4 Discuss reading with family and friends

Miss Malpas' book recommendations




Flat Stanley– The Original Adventure By Jeff Brown

By E.J.Clarke


'If you're not an animal that's alive today, and you're not an animal that's extinct either, what on earth are you?'


The Thieves of Ostia By Caroline Lawrence
